CUE is a collaborative fundraising organization that actively encourages and

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SWEET GARDEN PRAYER

I have talked about this year being Bethel's Dreaming Year, saying we are on a journey. A conversation with fellow clergy this week made me realize that "journey" is not the right word. A journey may not have a destination.

What we here at Bethel are on is a Pilgrimage. A pilgrimage has a destination (with specific points along the way) and a purpose. A journey is often in itself the purpose—to wander and explore. Exploration is certainly a part of Bethel's pilgrimage this year, but this is not aimless wandering.

What sets a church apart from clubs? Both center on relationships and community. The difference is where that centering comes from—for a country club it may be status or golf or tennis, for a civic organization it may be a specific charity or cause, etc.

For a religion, the focus must be on God as understood by that particular practice. For the Christian Church, the centering must be on the teachings of Jesus. Jesus' teachings direct us to God. The latest Pew Research shows that "nones" (religiously unaffiliated) people make up the largest group in the United States. Yet, research also shows that people in the U.S., especially young adults and teens, seek spiritual connection. This should be what sets church apart from clubs-spiritual connection. This is what makes the difference between a journey and a pilgrimage. A pilgrimage's purpose is spiritual connection. The destination is deeper connection with and through the Creator.

I've laid out the stops along the way for our Dreaming Pilgrimage—the four retreats; the listening sessions; in-gathering of hopes and dreams; Celebratory Retreat; and next steps. Each of these is a stop along our Pilgrimage, a destination in itself, but not the final destination. The final destination is that Deeper Spiritual Connection with each other and God that will fortify us for our future.

Consider this: We are co-creators with God. God provides us with building blocks. Our pilgrimage of connection will guide us into what we will build with those blocks. The chief cornerstone of the building blocks provided for us is Jesus who showed us how to use the blocks, how to build. Our Pilgrimage will lead us to what we build. Lately, social media has been offering these little videos asking "which would you live in forever" with pictures of several types of houses. Our Pilgrimage this year will guide us to what type of spiritual home we build.
