Today, Synergy provides a full continuum of care to assist individuals and families with immediate respite from violence, and services which empower clients to find and choose good options for future safety and success. In addition to our work to treat the effects of violence, we provide supportive services to families in crisis in an effort to prevent violence. Additionally, we focus on community education and social change in an effort to build a safer and more humane society.

Their fully integrated programs include crisis hotlines, emergency shelter, transitional housing, therapeutic services, advocacy, mentoring and violence prevention programs throughout Greater Kansas City.

Synergy's clients represent a broad cross-section of the population spanning gender, age, race and six county lines in Kansas and Missouri. Most often, clients have annual family incomes of less than \$25,000, making it difficult to access the variety of services they need through traditional means. We provide these services, which are so critical to the well-being of the family and community, to anyone that needs them regardless of ability to pay.

About Steppingstone (ECH)

Kansas City Steppingstone is a transitional living program that helps young people ages 16-21 transition safely and



successfully into independence. The program is based on positive youth development strategies and provides housing, employment services, education counseling, life skills training, and permanency planning.

An important part of the Steppingstone program is providing safe, stable housing accommodations in either campus or community apartments. When a youth is initially referred to Steppingstone, he or she meets with a case worker who administers an extensive Functional Status Rating (FSR). Based on the FSR, an individualized care plan is developed.

Steppingstone offers life skills training to help youth find work, with self-sufficiency being the end goal. The program helps youth create an education and career plan, develop work readiness skills, learn how to apply for jobs, dress for interviews, and more.

SWEET GARDEN OF PRAYER

Beloved Bethel,

As I write this, I have just come from my weekly Zoom meeting with clergy from across the Missouri Mid-South Conference. As Pentecost is this coming Sunday (May 28), the subject was the Holy Spirit, and more specifically, why we in the United Church of Christ are often afraid of Her.

My colleagues noted that people are afraid of the Holy Spirit because the Spirit changes you—and people are afraid of change. People fear change for many reasons. One is that they fear they are not up to the challenges change brings—can they learn a new way of doing things? I find the "new math" challenging, yet our school kids manage it quite well. Change requires an adjustment period—from a few hours or days to, well, a few decades. People are still referring to the UCC's *New Century Hymnal* as "that new hymnal" and many churches (like us) aren't yet using it. That "new" hymnal was published in 1995—34 years ago!

I think the biggest reason for fear is that the word change holds a stigma—a suggestion that whatever is changing had something "wrong" with it. The "old math" wasn't wrong. The "new math" isn't wrong, either. The answers are still the same. When people say they want to change the world, there is an implicit suggestion that the world is somehow screwed up. For decades, theologians, writers, and speakers have been talking about fixing a "Broken World," that God loves "broken" people—even that everyone is "broken" in some way. With all due respect to Henri Nouwen, one of my favorites, you are NOT broken. The church is NOT broken. The world is NOT broken.

Change is NOT fixing. Change is growth. We are GROWING.

As we grow, things must adjust to accommodate that growth. When you grew as a youngster, you needed new clothing to adjust to your size. You needed a "big kids bed" instead of a crib, then a bigger bed, and now likely a "king" or "queen" size bed. You began with mother's milk or formula, went on to baby food, on to other food, and now enjoy eating things your child self would have found to be "disgusting". Because, your nourishment required adjustments as you grew.

The same thing happens with Spiritual Growth. I recently saw the movie "Are You There, God? It's Me Margaret". The main character doesn't fear the changes that come as she moves into adulthood. Instead, she looks forward to them. That was a source of inspiration to generations of girls who grew up with the book by Judy Blume. As a church grows spiritually (as it should!), adjustments to accommodate that growth need to be made. We can view the Spirit as something to fear, and build up personal and physical walls—or bind ourselves with old practices the way the Chinese used to bind up girls' feet to keep girls dependent and weak. Or, we can embrace growth and welcome opportunities to accommodate it. Like the girls in the movie chanting, "We must, we must, we must increase our bust!" we can look forward to where the Spirit takes us, and wiggle our toes with adventure and strength.

Bethel has come a long way from the "babyhood" of our faith that would have built walls between us and others. The Spirit has taught us that ALL people are wonderfully and fearfully made in the image of God. We have adjusted our worship to include many forms of music and prayer that touch and inspire our souls.

Our Spiritual Growth calls us to make adjustments-like the beds we slept in as children. We welcome additions—the way we welcome new members of our families. I've never been afraid of a baby. No reason to fear an infant idea—or the Holy Spirit growing us in new ways.

Here is some food for thought. The Confirmation Class, as they prepare to make their commitment to Bethel, was asked to write down three things they love about the UCC and Bethel specifically, and three things they would like to see changed (or adjusted!).

Here are some of the things they loved:

- That all people are embraced and welcomed (including LGBTQ, POC, and those with differing religious views).
- The "democratic" polity.
- The worship includes congregation members' participation and involvement.
- Bethel's AWESOME music variety.
- Bethel's small size giving everyone a chance to know and support each other.
- All questions and opinions being respected.
- Bethel has FUN.
- Bethel has a lack of people trying to manipulate or intimidate others to force their own agendas.
- Bethel is made up of intelligent, thoughtful, and caring individuals.

Here are some of the things they'd like to change:

- That the UCC as a whole lacks a statement of core beliefs that can be observed across all member churches.
- Bethel's belief that it is "friendly and welcoming" is more "aspirational than effective". People are friendly "after you get to know them," but the congregation could use a class on how to talk to strangers.
- Too much of a "we've always done it this way" mindset.
- Bistro should be every week to get people to interact more.
- Sprucing up the walls with more color, artwork, etc.
- Organizing and cleaning up the nursery to make it more welcoming.
- More fun activities for the children—outdoors things—to get the kids more excited about coming to church.
- More church history information included in sermons.
- Moving church back to 9 am so there is more time for fellowship after the service.
- More ecumenical activities with other churches/moving "outside our comfort zone".
- Efforts for sustainability for the church.
- The Church needs to consider why it is putting so much money into facilities when multi-use buildings sharing space with other community organizations would make more sense.

UPDATE ON THE UGANDA MISSION FROM CHARLES SMITH

Charles Smith, missionary to Uganda who visited us in April, sent us a note of thanks for the opportunity to share his work with you, and a deep thanks for the financial support. He is now back in Uganda. Printed below is the newsletter he sends every few months.

Charles Mission News

May 19, 2023

Faith

The Prison Ministry team continues to move forward in faith. We had faith that we would be able to resume prison ministry when the 2020 lock-down prevented us from entering the prison. We continued to meet and to prepare materials. God rewarded that faith by growing the team. In January 2022, President Museveni announced the end of coronavirus restrictions. However, the prison remained closed to the ministry. We continued to prepare.

We returned to the prison for ministry in August 2022. We resumed ministry in faith that God would use us to deliver his message, and that his message would be received. Attendance by the prisoners reached numbers previously unimagined by me, 32% of the prison population. A friend who, years ago, spent four days in prison told me how important it is to the prisoners that a ministry team visits them faithfully. We endeavor to do that.

A month later we received permission to talk to the officer in charge of Koboko's other prison. He invited us to begin ministry at Lobule prison. At the same time we were directed to contact Uganda Prison Headquarters and seek a letter recognizing the ministry.



We were suddenly turned away from Gbukutu prison. We were told it was Ebola. We asked the officer in charge of Lobule prison, and he said no Ebola concerns in our part of the country, please continue to come. Later we learned it was persecution at Gbukutu because we are not all one denomination, specifically the denomination that was being favored. We continued to pray about it and have faith. God opened a way to receive a letter from Uganda Prison Headquarters officially recognizing Truth is Light Prison Ministry. God further used this to overcome the persecution to his ministry through us. I mentioned requesting this letter in the last newsletter. I mention it again because it is part of a bigger story, growing the team's faith and the inmates'

faith that we will come when allowed, and we remember them in prayer too.

The prison ministry team has begun to recognize the growth God has blessed us with, and the bounty of the harvest, even in the prison. Prisoners have requested permission to join us when they are released. The officer in charge of the prison said it is okay, and if they ask when they are eligible for release, he will provide them with our contact information. We have faith that they will be hungry for God, not just seeing us. Two were released just before Easter and they did visit a team meeting before returning to their homes. Unfortunately, their homes are too far away for them to participate regularly.

This is just the most recent fruit of the ministry. We continue to pray for provision. God has put it in our hearts to reach more prisons. This means I need to raise money for a vehicle. A Land Cruiser is sturdy and will survive the Ugandan roads so we can reach the prisons safely. The team is praying that people, perhaps someone you know, will contribute towards this.



Together this ministry is moving forward – in faith.
